Climate Connect Aotearoa

Climate Connect Aotearoa (CCA) is a climate innovation hub based in Tāmaki Makaurau. Our aim is to connect diverse groups and communities in Auckland and support them in creating future-focused solutions in the face of environmental issues and challenges in the region. We are guided by Te Tārukeā-Tāwhiri: Auckland's Climate Plan and its goals in building an equitable, climate resilient and low carbon Tāmaki Makaurau.

In 2023, we established He Kete Mātauranga – an online space designed to support businesses and communities in building climate resilience through Māori knowledge systems and frameworks. Since then, we have connected with Māori leaders and innovators through online interviews and explored what mātauranga Māori means to them and the role it plays in their climate action. In May 2024 – we hosted the inaugural He Kete Mātauranga Hui at Te Mahurehure Marae. Hoping to build on its success, we are so excited to host our second hui at Te Puna Creative Hub.

Te Puna Creative Hub

Te Puna Creative Hub aspires to be a world-class centre of excellence for creative industries in Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland, like no other in the world. A unique centre for screen, media, digital and creative technology, art, game development, music and performing arts, Te Puna Creative Hub is a space designed to foster collaboration, spark creativity and drive innovation. The hub provides the local community and creative businesses with access to world-class resources and opportunities, including a multi-functional digital theatre and black box studio. Te Puna is driven in partnership between Tātaki Auckland Unlimited, and Te Kawerau ā Maki.

Te Kawerau ā Maki

As the mana whenua authority for West Auckland and located right next door to Te Puna. Te Kawerau ā Maki gifted the names Te Puna, Kōmanawa and Takawai for the building and its main indoor spaces. They are currently in the planning phase for their new marae at Te Henga, a project called Te Henga Whakahirahira. Focused on sustainability, their new papakāinga will be built on ancestral whenua at the front of the Lake Wainamu dune system. Te Kawerau ā Maki are leading the whakatau for our hui and feature as one of three mātauranga Māori workshops.

Poukura (Director) - Naia Limited

Che is Poukura of Naia Limited, a Māori consultancy where he focuses principally on the tūpuna wisdom space as a guest speaker, researcher, leadership mentor and facilitator. He is currently leading regional research on the ceremonies and knowledge associated with the star Puanga and the application of tūpuna weather forecasting and seasonal changes to current land use. Che has experience as Deputy Secretary for the Ministry for the Environment and president of Te Pāti Māori and is currently on Ngā Pae o te Māramatanga board.

With over twenty years of experience in environmental spaces – his career reflects his personal commitment to protecting te mauri o te taiao. His expertise is in native forestry, ecological restoration, and conservation, rongoā Māori, resource management, para kore, ecotourism, and biodiversity care. He has a strong foundation in Te Ao Māori and is deeply committed to the service of his people. A true child of Tāne Mahuta, he is happiest when his hands are in the soil.

Taiao to Toi Māori

Guided by celebrated artists, musicians, and innovators, this session is a reminder that the way we tell our stories is just as important as the stories themselves. Nikau Hindin Ngai Tūpoto, Te Rarawa, Ngāpuhi

Contemporary Artist

Nikau Hindin is a barkcloth maker who works with aute (paper mulberry, Broussonetia papyrifera) and earth pigments. She has spent the past decade reinvigorating the practice of aute in Aotearoa – including teaching this knowledge to a new generation of makers. Her practice is devoted to the life cycle of the paper mulberry plant, from its growing and harvesting, to processing the inner bark and creating a fine cloth. Working intimately with plants and tools that come from the natural environment, Hindin aligns her practices with the maramataka. Her work has been recognised internationally and is currently some of the most widely exhibited examples of earth pigment exploration by a contemporary Māori artist.

Singer, Songwriter

Celebrated for her soulful voice and authentic performances, her talent has seen her not only earn the respect of her musical peers but also garner industry recognition. She was awarded Best Female Artist at the Māori Music Awards in 2015 and the Mana Reo Award at the Aotearoa Music Awards in 2020. Beyond music, Majic is passionate about indigenous rights and equality. She comes from a strong background of artistry and activism and learnt at a young age that music could be a beacon of change. As a māmā to three and deeply connected to her iwi, she is determined to use her voice to uplift, empower and inspire future generations.

Artist

Raukura is a multi-disciplinary artist, architect, and māmā of two kōtiro based in Tāmaki Makaurau. She has a Master of Architecture (Prof) from the University of Auckland and is a registered Architect with the NZRAB. Through her research into atua wāhine and her journey in reconnecting with her whakapapa, painting is a tool to connect to her tīpuna. She uses natural materials collected from Papatūānuku in her practice, such as aumoana, a blue clay from her tīpuna whenua of Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki and onepū, black iron sands from Te Uru, Auckland's West coast. Her artwork has been exhibited throughout Aotearoa and internationally including in Japan and Australia.

Kaupapa Māori Environmental Consultant

Tina Porou is the founder of Poipoia, a kaupapa Māori consultancy dedicated to providing environmental services to iwi, hapu, and both the public and private sectors. Poipoia has an ever-growing team of experienced hapū practitioners and technicians in the field of resource management from across Aotearoa. In 2016, Tina was made a member of the New Zealand Order of Merit for her service to Māori and the environment, and she won a Sir Peter Blake Emerging Leader Award in 2015. Tina holds board governance positions with the Lake Taupō Forest Trust, Ngāti Porou Forests, Pahiatua Incorporation, and the Asia New Zealand Foundation.
